Come, ye thankful people, come, raise the song of harvest home.....

'Thank you so much for saying thank you', they said, 'it made all the difference'. We instill saying 'thank you' in our children, and with good reason. During Covid, we systematically said thank you, and it has been hugely appreciated.

Now we have reached Harvest, and we come to thank all those who supply our food, from the fishermen, farmers and growers along the supply chain to our supermarkets and shops. Maybe we cannot sing it, but nonetheless saying thank you is transformational. It is a powerful and vital thing: instead of looking at ourselves we focus on the giver.

Beyond thanking each other though, we thank God our heavenly Father for his total provision for us – in creation, in our fellow humanity and in Jesus Christ. It is also one of the greatest gifts we can give to God. From beginning to end, the Bible exhorts us to give thanks to him for all that he gives us: 'Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving' says the psalmist. God delights in that, when we stop looking at ourselves and focus on him, and acknowledge his worth.

Saying thank you reminds us that it is God who is ultimately our provider. But can we still thank God when times are really hard? Frequently in the Bible people have thanked God even when they were in the direst situation. From the horrors of prison, Paul was able to write: 'Sing and make melody to the Lord in your hearts, giving thanks to God the Father at all times'. David, again and again, ends the bleakest of Psalms with a note of praise. In Psalm 13, he moves from, 'How long, O Lord?' to 'I will sing to the Lord, because he has dealt beautifully with me.'

How can we do that, when life continues to be so difficult for many of us? Try to list the many blessings he has given us, whatever they may be – our material blessings, the people in our lives, his salvation in Jesus Christ, and for his continued presence and power in our lives. Holding on to, and thanking God, for his faithful goodness towards us allows him to pour out those blessings on us. It is transformational.

St Mary's, Atherstone live streams to 1500 people

The Revd Michael Brandsma and the team at St Mary's, Atherstone have been streaming their mid-week and Sunday services on Facebook and receiving a large number of views.

Since the Covid 19 lockdown started in March, Michael began to use his platform on Facebook as a place to post encouragement and uplift. He would post words of encouragement on his own Facebook page, St Mary's, Atherstone's Facebook page and the Atherstone community forum.

The administration team that oversees the Atherstone Community Forum encouraged Michael to begin live streaming his Easter services.

On Palm Sunday, the 5th April, Michael streamed his first service on Facebook to reach out to the congregation and community. His son-in-law arrived in the morning to help set up and Michael had never done anything like this before. Live Facebook streaming was daunting for him. Yet, the service went well and was well received.

The church then streamed all of their Easter services: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday. The viewing numbers kept growing.

After Easter, the church began to stream their regular worship on Facebook – their midweek worship on a Wednesday, their 10.30am Sunday worship as well as introducing a Friday at 12.01pm prayer time.

The services are a variety of liturgical patterns and are led by either Michael, or the church's Reader, John Stock. They invite various congregation members to participate in readings and prayers. They live stream by using two mobile phones placed on tripods, one streaming to the St Mary Atherstone Facebook page and the other to the Atherstone and Hinterland Forum Facebook page.

Michael says:

"The services have been seen by thousands of people. The mid-week viewings total an average of 1400 to 1600 views and Sunday viewing average approximately 1300 to as many as 2000 on two occasions."

UHCW NHS Trust uses 'Hymns We Love' reflections on hospital radio

In Spring this year, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, launched a free national phoneline as a simple new way to bring worship and prayer into people's homes while church buildings were closed during the coronavirus lockdown. The phone line has been very popular and will remain despite lockdown easing and some churches reopening.



The Daily Hope phone line have partnered with Coventry and Warwickshire NHS Trust Chaplaincy and Voluntary services who are piloting 'Hymns We Love' a selection of reflections based on hymns, their meaning and context written and narrated by Steve Cramer, on their hospital radio. This is a brilliant way to give peace and spiritual nourishment to patients, staff, and volunteers alike.

'Hymns We Love' is updated daily and provides a hymn and reflection. Hymns include, 'How great Thou art', 'Rock of Ages', 'Amazing grace', 'The Lord's my Shepherd', and 'And can it be?'.

Commenting on Daily Hope, the Archbishop of Canterbury says:

"Daily Hope has been a lifeline for tens of thousands of people in the last few months. We've heard stories of people using it who are regular church attenders and those who aren't. That's a testimony to the vital importance of Daily Hope."

Bishop Christopher says,

"Hymns heal the heart. Hospital chaplains know that well. By drawing out their meaning, these reflections will help the 'Hymns We Love' to bring solace to the soul and sing out hope in times of struggle as well as joy."

The road to ordination training

Communications Officer, Anna, chats to one our newest ordinands, Cerys Smith, about the vocations process and her path to ordination training.



Can you tell us about when you first felt the call to ordained ministry?

I have always had a sense of vocation just not necessarily a vocation to ordained ministry. I have always found and done work that I am passionate about that helps people, and in hindsight, the call to ordination started with my internship in the Reconciliation Ministry at Coventry Cathedral and taking it was a leap of faith for me. Following my internship, a calling to explore ordained ministry gradually built over a couple of months in a series of moments that included being at a Monday morning Holy Communion at the Cathedral where I had a clear thought that "I want to do that", I want to preside at the Eucharist; and an overwhelming sense of wanting to join in with what God was doing following a diocesan companionship link trip to Kenya, led by the Bishop of Warwick, that I was fortunate enough to be a part of.

What was your experience of the vocations process?

My experience of the vocations process has been overwhelmingly positive. Everyone I talked to, worked with and who helped me discern my calling, and ultimately being accepted for training, was so supportive, understanding with what I was going through, and encouraging of my vocation whether or not it turned out to be for ordination.

This year's BAP (Bishop's Advisory Panel) interviews were over Zoom, how did you find them?

It was very intense not just with the format of the interviews, only two 1 hour interviews on one day (normally the BAP is over 3 days), but also the fact it happened during lockdown and it was a new system they had been created and not tested before. However, Ellie Clack (DDO) and her team were amazing in keeping us calm, getting us answers and being so supportive throughout it all.

What is next for you?

I am moving to Durham in September to train at Cranmer Hall (a theology college at Durham University). I will be an ordinand there for 3 years, before, hopefully, returning to Coventry as a curate.
