Every time we meet to break bread we sing or we say 'Heaven and earth are full of your glory'. The season of Epiphany invites us to open our eyes to the glory of God. But are our eyes truly open to God's glory? Do we look at others, at the creation, even at God, through lenses smeared by cynicism, resignation or even fatalism? Have we lost that childlike capacity for wonder and for awe? As Jesus tells Nicodemus, we need to be born from above to see the kingdom of God. Jn.3.3. It is in God's light that we can see the light of God's glory. Ps.36.9.



As we begin – and continue in – the New Year, let us remind ourselves that God has put eternity in our hearts and that we are citizens of heaven, that we are no longer our own but God's. Let us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith. With Jesus at the centre, our eyes will be opened.

We might want to ponder the extraordinary and wonderful prayer of Jesus:

'Father, I desire that those you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory, which you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world.' John 17.24.

Let us dare to pray that God will open our eyes to 'the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.' 2 Cor.4.6.

New Diocesan Spirituality advisor

The Revd Craig Grocock, Vicar of St Andrew's Shottery, has been announced as the new Diocesan Spirituality advisor.

In a Zoom interview with Bishop John, Craig talked about his background and what he would like to do in the role.



Craig described about how he became a Christian at the age of 16 and was struck by the verse John 10:10, *"The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full."*

A few years later he felt a calling to work in the church. A woman at his church saw in Craig a calling to evangelism, particularly among children and young people. This led him into ministry with the Church Army and afterwards as a Children and Families Minister at All Saints, Bedworth. After five years, Craig moved to Warwick and started feeling a call to ordination. He talked to the then Bishop of Warwick, Bishop Anthony, about his calling and how his spiritual life underpinned this calling.

Craig has now been ordained for fifteen years. Over the past fifteen years he has been trained as a Spiritual Director with the Jesuits. He also has retained close connections with the Baptist and Pentecostal churches which has informed his spiritual life.

Over the past few years, Craig has been encouraged by the work the diocese has done with Healthy Churches and the eight essential qualities. In particular, he has seen passionate spirituality develop across the diocese and looks forward to building on this.

In the next few months, Craig is keen to travel to different areas of the diocese (whether on Zoom or in person) to listen to and work with people on spirituality.

Wellesbourne Walk Through Nativity

Like all churches, St Peter's Church in Wellesbourne, celebrated Advent and Christmas differently this year. One of the big differences was that they told the story of the nativity outside.



The team at St Peter's wanted to give local families the very best experience of Christmas, despite the Covid 19 pandemic. Therefore, instead of focusing on what they can't do they changed their perspective and thought about what they could do. An idea from the charity 'Faith in Kids' provided the perfect solution—an outdoor, socially distanced, walk through nativity!

On Saturday 19th December, the church welcomed families at timed intervals and took them on a journey through the Christmas story. Families were met by an angel at the entrance of the churchyard who told them of the good news of a special baby to be born. Then they were led on a trail lit by lanterns to a series of stations. At these stations they met by a Roman soldier (who told them about the census), and then on to Joseph, the shepherds, the wise men and finally they came to a stable filled with hay bales where they found Mary and baby Jesus.

Vicar of St Peter's, the Revd Greg Bartlem says;

"Safety is key for everyone involved, and we did a thorough risk assessment. This is something we've never done before, but it's a brilliant idea from Faith in Kids to do something new that made Christmas special. We literally guided families to find Jesus. What better way to do Christmas!"
