An Introduction to the Fosse Deanery

- The Deanery comprises the large town and parishes in and around Stratford Upon Avon, a large village – Wellesbourne, and lots of smaller rural parishes. The Deanery currently has 8.5 stipendiary clergy posts, several self supporting and retired clergy and 2 curates who serve the 8 benefices with their 25 parishes. We see the role of the deanery as supporting the mission and ministry of the parishes in the deanery, especially through the collegiality of the clergy.
- We support one another through
 - Monthly Chapter meetings beginning with a eucharist and then lunch
 - Co-operation and generosity in sharing resources
 - Trying new ways of doing things as we re-imagine rural and town ministry for today.
- We are currently in the final stages of implementing our long-term Deanery Plan. This has been largely shaped in response to the missional opportunities of new housing developments elsewhere in the deanery but also by a desire to work in collaboration across parish boundaries as we support one another. The churches in the Barford Benefice have worked well together for many years and there is a real commitment to continue under the leadership of their new vicar. We look forward to welcoming a priest with passion for extending God's kingdom in these rural communities

A Passion for Rural Ministry and Community Life

Community is at the heart of our benefice. The church plays a key role in village life, not only through worship but also through fundraising events, seasonal celebrations, and acts of service. We want to build on this, strengthening our ties with the wider village and making the church a place where everyone feels welcome.

Like many rural churches, we have smaller congregations and an ageing church population, but our villages are also evolving, bringing fresh opportunities to connect with new residents. We need a priest-in-charge who understands the rhythm of rural life, values deep-rooted traditions, and is excited by the prospect of engaging with the whole community.

Being a Visible and Approachable Leader

For us, leadership isn't just about Sundays—it's about being a recognisable and involved presence in village life. We are looking for someone who will be seen and known across our three villages, engaging not just with church members but with the wider community.

This means being present at village events, leading school assemblies, making time for pastoral visits, and working alongside others on community projects. The opportunity to serve as an ex-officio school governor provides another way to strengthen our relationship with local families.

With a rectory provided within the benefice, this is a place where our new priest-in-charge can truly put down roots. We hope to find someone who will embrace this as more than a role—becoming a valued and familiar presence in our villages.



One Team, Worshipping Together



- As a benefice, we share in worship and community life, supporting one another while maintaining the unique character of each of our churches. A keyway we come together is through the monthly Benefice Service, which rotates between our three parishes and offers a shared opportunity for Holy Communion and fellowship.
- During the interregnum, our Associate Minister has worked tirelessly
 to keep everyone cared for and supported. We are fortunate to have
 three Readers who serve across the benefice, while each church has
 its own dedicated Churchwardens, volunteers and PCC, ensuring
 strong local leadership and active involvement in church life. With a
 solid foundation in place, we look forward with hope to the future,
 welcoming a new leader who will journey with us in faith and
 fellowship.
- Beyond our regular services, our churches host fundraising events, Lent lunches, concerts, and social gatherings, strengthening our sense of belonging not just within our congregations, but across the benefice and within the wider village communities. Hospitality is at the heart of our churches, with coffee served after services and regular opportunities for fellowship, creating a warm and welcoming space for conversation and connection.

BARFORD PARISH CHURCH

- The Domesday Book of 1085 records a priest in Barford, suggesting a place of worship
 existed even earlier. The Saxon church was rebuilt in the 13th century and remained until it
 became unsafe, leading to reconstruction in 1844–1845 in a plain Victorian style. The
 original tower, which still bears the mark of a cannon ball fired by Parliamentarians en route
 to the Battle of Edge Hill, is the only surviving feature of the earlier building.
- St. Peter's has been a church of prayer, celebration, and remembrance for centuries, with many visitors commenting on its sense of tranquillity. Services are held every Sunday, including Holy Communion twice a month, a monthly Benefice Service, and a Family Service. Baptisms take place within the main services. The churchyard includes a Garden of Remembrance and a burial extension.
- We involve the village school in Family Services as often as possible, and pupils participate in Harvest, Christmas, Remembrance, Advent, Lent, and end-of-term services. We have also successfully introduced congregation members sharing their faith and work, enriching worship with personal reflections.
- The Tower houses six bells, which are popular with visiting ringers. At present there is only a small band of village ringers and are therefore only rung occasionally .They are used by the Coventry Guild of Bellringers for training, with potential for revival in the future.
- Over the years, St. Peter's has hosted many varied fundraising events, Lent lunches, BBQ, Saturday coffee mornings, open gardens, concerts, and even pancake races for children.
- St. Peter's is supported by a committed team of volunteers, with rotas for welcomers, readers, prayer leaders, and assistance with the chalice. With two Churchwardens, a deputy, three Readers, and an active PCC, there is a strong core of worshippers determined to maintain and enrich the church's ministry. As we look to the future with hope, we welcome a leader who will work alongside us, nurturing our strengths and helping us continue to grow as a vibrant church at the heart of the community.

Barford, St Peters COE Primary School

- Barford St Peter's is a single-form entry school with around 200 pupils and a pre-school. It has a strong reputation for high standards, excellent behaviour, and close community ties. More information can be found at https://www.barfordstpeters.org
- The Christian ethos is central to school life, expressed in its mission: Together We Love; Together We Learn, and its vision based on 1 Peter 4:8–10. Daily collective worship and a values-led approach are integral to its culture.
- Around ten services are held in church each year to mark key moments in the Christian calendar (open to the whole community), and pupils regularly contribute to Family Services throughout the year. The previous priest-incharge regularly led collective worship, something the school is keen to continue.
- The school plays a central role in village life. Major community events include the summer and Christmas fayres and bonfire night, all run by the PTA (FABS).
- The link between the school and church is recognised by Ofsted, SIAMS, and the Diocese as exceptionally strong. A new priest-in-charge would continue this valued partnership—supporting RE, worship, and helping young people feel at home in the church.

SHERBOURNE PARISH CHURCH

- The present All Saints Church is a beautiful Victorian Grade II listed building, designed by George Gilbert Scott RA., modelled on Salisbury Cathedral and commissioned by Louisa Ann Ryland, in 1864.
- The first church on the site was Saxon, which was significantly altered during the Norman period. It was rebuilt in the 14th Century, and the nave and tower were rebuilt again in 1747 by Thomas Webb. The remainder was demolished and rebuilt in 1802 by Rev. Elias Webb, and Thomas Webb Edge, Joint Lords of the Manor. There was a priest in Sherboune in 1086.
- The Church has excellent bells, with the Peal of Six Bells being in the upper stage of the tower. One is by Hugh Watts of Leicester, dated 1632 and the others are by Meares of Whitechapel, in 1863. All Saints continues to host many bell ringing competitions.
- All Saints is a very popular wedding and baptism venue. There is a close relationship with Sherbourne Park. There is a childrens area at the rear of the church. Unlike the other parishes, Sherbourne currently does not have a village hall, which means the church hosts village meetings, coffee mornings and acts as the polling station when required.
- All Saints has its own small band of cheerful volunteers who generously offer their time and skills in preparing for services and hosting fundraising events.





WASPERTON PARISH CHURCH

- Rural church on an ancient settlement dating from the 4th century, having Roman, British, Anglo Saxon, Pagan and Christian influences with a rich cultural and architectural heritage.
- Located in Wasperton, named in the Domesday book, with a population of between 90 and 292 consistently over the period relatively unaltered since the village map was produced in 1686, the church being on site since 1279 with the main structure constructed in 1822.
- Commissioned and paid for by Thomas Leveson Lane for £3000 to plans by Sir George Gilbert Scott and Augustus Welby Northmore Pugin - a rare example of such collaboration.
- The Bell turret over the nave contains two bells, one founded by Henry Bagley cast in 1683 and the other founded by Thomas Mears dated 1817.
- The village hall, originally the school house was built in 1843 and is a thriving part of the Wasperton community. Both the PCC and the Village Hall committee work in tandem to use this valuable space for the benefit of the Wasperton community, with Fetes, Gatherings, Art Classes and a pop-up pub, The Wobbly Wasp bringing people together.
- The Church, Churchyard and PCC are actively supported by a small band of volunteers, making this a true community church.


Each village offers a range of valuable facilities:

- Strong community feelings that represent the uniqueness of each church





