Mission Hub support for pioneering aspect of the role

As the Mission Hub serving Nuneaton deanery, we are really excited about the mission possibilities this new post offers. The Hub has a proven track record of supporting fresh expressions of church, a funded church plant and a church regeneration plant.

Our support to the new incumbent will be four-fold. Firstly, in providing expertise and training to the incumbent and to the congregation of All Saints with regard to pioneering new ministry. Secondly, in providing resources and people to help with the establishment of new worshipping communities on newer housing estates identified as having potential for missional growth. Thirdly, providing an expert to liaise with housing estate developers, local government and politicians to source funding and buildings that could be used for community purposes. Finally, with prayer. One of our Mission Hub Associates is regularly prayer walking the streets of the new housing estates, spiritually preparing the ground for the establishment of new worshipping communities. We look forward to working closely and strategically with the new incumbent in an area which is a key part of our deanery plan.

Introduction to this dual role and why we are excited about it Interim Priest in Charge All Saints, Chilvers Coton and St Mary's, Astley/0.4 Deanery Pioneer Minister.

This is an interim post for 3 years (There is potential to extend by a further 3 years)

The interim minister will report will work in close partnership with the Archdeacon Missioner, Director of Healthy Churches and New Worshipping Communities and the Assistant Area Dean of Nuneaton.

We are looking and praying for an enthusiastic, energetic and passionate Pioneer Minister and Priest in Charge to lead our churches to engage with new housing and bring life to the existing parishes and their churches.

The Diocese of Coventry has an exciting growth strategy aiming to launch 150 new worshipping communities before the end of this decade and we believe that with two large new areas of housing within Coton parish, plus another 1000+ houses in the neighbouring parish of Attleborough there is a great opportunity to do a new work.

General

The general role of an Interim Minister is to supports the process of revitalising parishes as they adapt to changing circumstances and explore how best to respond in positive, realistic and fruitful ways. This role description notes the regulations and guidance around use of interim ministry and seeks to follow that guidance fully. Some specific areas relating to the role are as follows:

- 1. To share with the Bishop of Coventry both in the cure of souls and in responsibility, under God, for growing of the kingdom in the parish.
- 2. To have regard to the calling and responsibilities of the clergy as described in the Canons, the Ordinal, the Code of Professional Conduct for the Clergy.
- 3. To ensure the highest possible standards in safeguarding.
- 4. To ensure that a good standard of worship, preaching and pastoral care is provided.
- 5. To further develop Lay and Self-Supporting ministry and leadership
- 6. To proclaim the gospel in word and deed as an agent of God's purpose and love.
- 7. To work collaboratively and ecumenically within the Deanery and Diocese both in current mission and ministry and in the reshaping of ministry as resources and opportunities will require.
- 8. To prepare the parishes for the long-term leadership that will follow this interim period.
- 9. To attend the clergy training events, chapter meetings, Deanery synod and other appropriate meetings as necessary.

Deanery Pioneer Minister Role

Introduction, the context and the opportunity

Nuneaton is currently undergoing transformational building work with both the regeneration of the town centre and major housing developments around the edge of the town. Approximately 7500 new homes are either in the process of being built or due to be built in the next 5 years. As a deanery we spotted there is a huge missional imperative to proclaim the good news, bringing people to Christ and transforming community. It is likely that the focus of this role will be in the new housing within the parish of Coton or Attleborough, but there is also encouragement to work across parish boundaries within Nuneaton as a whole.

Main Duties and Responsibilities

Based in the new housing estate(s)

- Foster and nurture prayer for the area
- Identify the estate where a new Worshipping Community could be grown
- Begin to build relationships and a sense of community
- Communicate and share faith as relationships grow

- Recruit and train a team (which can be drawn from churches across the deanery)
- This is a role for a creative, entrepreneurial candidate who isn't afraid of taking risks and learning from experiences, both positive and negative

Support

We realise that as a pioneer role this is a ministry which can both be inspiring and isolating so we want to support you

- Accountability and support for this role will be provided by the Assistant Area Dean (who is currently vicar of Holy Trinity Attleborough).
- The pioneer minister will be part of a group of ordained church planters in the deanery.
- The local resourcing Mission Hub based in Bedworth is committed to support with training, mentoring and providing specific expertise in areas such as worship and growing faith.

Outcomes for deanery pioneer post

- 1. An established worshipping Community on one of the housing estates in Nuneaton is formed.
- 2. A range of activities and events that engage regularly with the local community within one or more of the new housing areas has been started.

Our Life together and our people

There are currently 73 on the Electoral Roll. We have two Associate Ministers (one in full time

employment and the other, now retired from secular employment and with links to Hospital Chaplaincy at our local hospital) and a Licensed Lay Minister (Reader). We have other members of the congregation who get involved with leading worship. In recent months we have actively encouraged other newer, members to explore leading parts of our worship. The Ministry Team which includes the two wardens meet regularly to plan the worship at All Saints. The two



assistant wardens.

My Church Family is very important to me. It is a loving, caring, supportive group of people who I can trust and is an extension of my own family. They are friends and are always there for me.

During my 60 year association with All Saints I have been involved in many roles. Worshipper, administrator, lesson reader, intercessor, music group member to name but a few. It has given me the opportunity to share that love and the glory of Christ Jesus, through the Church. Family.

Sadly, we lost our worship band some time ago. This is something we would very much like to restart when the time is right. There is also an organist who currently only plays for special occasions.

We employ a part time Parish Administrator who works weekday mornings and also deals with most of the dayto-day financial matters. We also have members of the congregation who act as vergers as and when required for weddings and funerals.

With lockdown, home communions and visits into the local care homes ceased and we currently have limited options for taking communion to the housebound. This is something we know we need to address.

We have 4 small groups, two Bible based and two social - a Ladies Book club and a Men's curry night. This is an area for growth.

Healing Ministry

Our church as a long history of this powerful ministry. Although we no longer hold monthly healing services, we still often use the 5th Sundays for Healing Ministry services. Over the years we have heard some powerful testimonies and seen God powerfully work in people's lives through this ministry. We would love to regrow this aspect of our wider ministry to the community. We maintain a confidential prayer chain for those in need of God's help.

Messy Church

We launched our Messy Church as a response to the absence of children on our church. With basically only children in the church being those of families seeking baptism. PCC met with the leader of a local youth and families initiative to see what we could do to engage with families. After a long discussion looking at various options, we asked the question, "If we were to do just one thing to address our concern, what would you suggest?" The answer was unequivocal. Start a Messy Church. That meeting was in autumn 2013. We



had contacts with a local church that had been running a Messy Church for some time and asked if we could visit and talk to them about their experience of setting it up. Following that we spent time looking at the practicalities and attendant costs and resourcing. Individuals in the church were approached and a team brought together. We set a launch day for the 3rd Sunday in March



2014. We put information into local schools and a lot of prayer. Fears of a no-show were quickly dispelled as we had over 50 people including over 20 children. Our average congregation has been in the upper 50's for the almost 10 years we have been running. Twice we have topped the 100 mark! Since restarting after the pandemic, we are averaging around 60 attendees each month. We target primary school age children but have a "baby/toddler corner" as well.

Format: 3rd Sunday afternoon of each month starting at 3:30 In our Parish Hall

We start with an hour of craft activities with tea, coffee, squash and biscuits available.



The activities are all linked to a Bible story which is printed in our Programme along with details of future Messy Churches and linked events and services.

This is followed by a "Celebration" based around the Bible Story. It includes linking the activities to the story and builds on the "talk about" questions for each activity along with songs, prayers and active "worship"

By the time that has concluded, the main part of the hall is miraculously transformed into a dining room with a hot meal waiting for the families and helpers.

By about 5:30, the families are fed, both physically and spiritually and many help us to clear the hall before heading home.

Messy Church is our best attended service with between 70 and 90 attending, and gives us access to well over a hundred families. They receive monthly invites to Messy Church, Morning Celebration and other family focused events both at our church and within the town.



Over the years we have had some baptisms and confirmations from our Messy Church family. One hope for the future is that we will be able to better support the children as they outgrow what we do. Currently we have a number of older siblings who work as helpers alongside the team. For many in this congregation, it is the only church service they regularly attend. We are officially registered with "Messy Church" organisation.

Lay ministry

Our church is blessed by people who give generously of their time to do the day to day tasks that need doing. Flower arranging, cleaning, making coffee, churchyard tiding, gardening are just the tip of an iceberg of jobs that keep the buildings as welcoming spaces for our community. We have a number of people actively involved in ministry in services. One of them is currently exploring a call to formal ministry.

Communications

We have a Parish Office where people can contact us, as well as through Facebook and our website. We have a weekly newsletter for the two churches which has information about services and upcoming events. It has



Saints in 1938 where I was Christened. I attended Sunday school. I was confirmed there and joined the Youth Fellowship. In 1966 I moved away where I married and my daughter was born. Since starting to attend All Saints church, after Covid, we have been made to feel very welcome by everyone. One of the best aspects of the church is the inclusivity; they allow the children to stay in and sometimes participate in the services. We thoroughly enjoy the morning celebration (and accompanying breakfast) for our family, whilst the communion services certainly cater to our more traditional beliefs. David, Vicky and Orlaith

invitations to Messy Church and Morning Celebration in the week before the service. They also receive other appropriate information about Family Friendly events such as the Crib Service, Christingle and other suitable events in the town and other churches.

Is the Holy Spirit calling you to be our next vicar?

We are looking for someone who is excited at the prospect of working with us in our parish on developing our worship and ministry to the parish and on mission and outreach into the new developments. The population of the borough has increased by at least 10,000 in the past 5 years.

With another 2000+ new homes planned in just our parish, this growth rate will continue.

We are passionate that these new homes are reached by our churches. We know from the large number of families who have engaged with our Messy Church over the past decade that there is a harvest waiting for workers. We need to be searching out the fruit that needs picking. We acknowledge we need to work across parish boundaries if we are to fulfil the great commission Jesus gives us.

Are you the person who can help us do this?

Inspire

Inspire, challenge and encourage us to deepen our walk with Jesus.

Lead

To be a listening, enabling and delegating leader who gives time and energy to the benefice and to lead us forward in mission in our parish and collaboratively with neighbouring parishes.

You need to be passionate about discipleship and committed to bringing all ages to faith in Jesus Christ and enabling the church in this ministry. This would include continuing and strengthening links with local schools.

Are we your next church?

All Saints has a committed core of people, who give tirelessly of themselves and their gifts. Over the last few years our vision has been to 'be the people God wants us to be'

Our church is a place where local people feel safe and invest in supporting each other.

Alongside the difficulties and sadness, the pandemic provided us with many opportunities to reach out in love to support families with a variety of needs.

We welcome all, and we try to ensure that our faith is shown through actions rather than words alone. Messy Church was well established pre-pandemic, and was quickly re-established when it reopened. It has been central to much of our outreach to families. We communicate twice a month with an ever-growing list of families about our two main services for families — Messy Church and Morning Celebration. The latter being an informal service which starts with a light breakfast and is designed to engage with the unchurched families as well as giving a different experience to our regular worshipers.

We have a history of regularly leading assemblies at the Church school. We regularly welcome groups from local schools, including the secondary school, into the church to talk about various aspects of the life and purpose of the church in the community. We also get school groups visiting as part of their local history work relating to World War 2.

Our buildings and grounds

The Church Building

There has been a church on the site since Saxon times. The later 12th century church was destroyed in an air raid in 1941. German prisoners of war volunteered to help rebuild the



present church making All Saints Chilvers Coton a focus of international reconciliation and a witness to the healing that Jesus can bring.

The famous novelist, George Eliot, (Mary Ann Evans) was baptised in the church. The church features as "Shepperton" in her novel, "Scenes of Clerical Life". Mary Ann Evans (George Eliot) was a worshipper at All Saints until she was 21. About 10 years ago we installed a coffee bar in the church and updated the sound system to be a full AV system including provision for a worship group with microphones, foldback etc. In response to the Covid Pandemic we have installed a Labyrinth with a memorial stone at its centre on the lawned area in front of the church. This was formally opened on December 3rd 2022 by the Viscount Daventry, patron of the benefice.

The church has a fine peal of 10 bells which are regularly rung by visiting bell ringers who also often ring for weddings and other special events.

The Churchyard (8 acres, about 3.2 ha) surrounds the church and is one of the larger open spaces in the Borough. The area is mainly headstones but with some grassed areas. There are cremation plots and a memorial wall. It is a closed church yard and its maintenance is the responsibility of the borough council. It is used for burial re-openings only and burial of ashes.

The Vicarage is a pleasant 5-bedroom dwelling built in 1934. It is centrally heated, has a modern kitchen and is double-glazed throughout. It has a fairly large garden which adjoins the churchyard. It is a ten-minute walk to the town centre.





The Parish Hall was built in 1932 and consists of a large main hall with a high barrel roof, a stage, a small hall divided from the main hall by a sliding partition, a comfortably furnished parish lounge with AV facilities and the parish office.

Church usage includes our Monthly Messy Church, Little Saints Play and Stay and meetings including PCC, socials and other events such as table top sales and seasonal fairs.

Additionally, the hall is widely used by the community. We host a Scout troop and a number of other groups.

The hall is equipped with a professional standard kitchen which has recently had a new catering oven, fridge freezer and water heaters. Following a recent inspection we have been awarded

a food hygiene rating of 5. Lettings of the hall pay the caretaker/site manager's wages and running costs with a small additional income going to

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






The Parish

The Parish of Chilvers Coton lies in Nuneaton Deanery and covers approximately 400 hectares (1000 acres) within the borough of Nuneaton and Bedworth. It lies to the south of the town centre. It lies astride the main A444 trunk road to Coventry and also the Nuneaton - Coventry



The borough of Nuneaton and Bedworth has a population estimated currently at over 130,000. It contains areas of social deprivation through to very affluent areas.

Within Coton Parish

The population of the parish is recorded as 15575 based on the current Church Urban Fund figures and is predominantly middle-aged, skilled and semi-skilled workers. The south-east corner of the Parish is an Urban Priority area. The parish is classified as being among the most deprived in the country (Church Urban Fund data).

The majority of Nuneaton's Muslim community live within the parish which would indicate that it may be more ethnically diverse than the town.

An extensive new housing development with over 1000 houses has been built in the parish and currently there are two more areas being developed for housing. In the area designated as Heath End/Arbury at least 1525 houses are to be built and the Gypsy Lane site is having over 575 houses built on it. These provide a huge opportunity for Mission and Outreach.

At the same time over 1000 new houses are being built in our neighbouring parish of Attleborough. We are already talking to them about the possibility of collaboratively working on this opportunity. The development policy documents for the largest site include provision for a primary school and local centre including community facilities. Similar references to community provisions are in the Policy documents for the other sites. These are places where we could perhaps establish church activities.

Industry - his includes light engineering, electronics, a boatyard and extensive warehousing. There are dozens of small independent firms based in the parish, as well as several large factories and distribution centres.

Commerce and retail outlets - there is a typical urban mix, including town centre shops and stores, street market, public houses, restaurants, timber and builders' merchants, car sales rooms, offices (solicitors, accountants) and local authority offices.

Rope Walk, an indoor shopping development was built in the town centre area of the parish several years ago and there are extensive plans for the regeneration of the town centre which includes a Hilton Hotel and multiscreen cinema which are currently being built (2023)

Bermuda Park, a large area in the south of the Parish with a mix of commercial premises and warehouses, hotels, restaurants, fast food outlets, a multi-screen cinema and other leisure facilities. There is also an additional railway station at Bermuda Park which opened in 2016 The main station is Trent Valley near the centre of the town. It's main line link to Euston Station makes Nuneaton a dormitory town for commuters as it is only about a one hour journey into London.

Sports and leisure - in the parish we have a competition size swimming pool with leisure pool and fitness complex, the Nuneaton Lawn Tennis Club, a cricket ground, municipal park with museum and art gallery. There is an all-weather athletics track and stadium with football pitches and a number of other recreation grounds plus other of sports, leisure and social clubs.

Schools - there are 2 Infants' schools, 2 Primary schools 2 Junior schools, 2 Secondary schools and the Oakwood Special Schools (Primary and Secondary)

We have very positive links with our own school, All Saints CofE Primary School and Nursery. We have established links with two other primary schools and with the Secondary school, George Eliot Academy.

Three of the schools in the parish are Roman Catholic schools.



Hospitals and health services - there is a large

modern general hospital with an accident and emergency unit, a maternity unit and a day-care hospice within the hospital grounds. The hospital has a new training centre and a number of specialist units and clinics.

It is worth noting that the hospital is undergoing significant expansion to meet the needs of a growing local population.

There are a number of sheltered and semi sheltered housing complexes in the parish.

There are 11 general practitioners' surgeries and 6 dental surgeries. The ambulance depot has recently relocated to new premises on the hospital site. The hospital has a well-established resident chaplaincy team augmented by a team of volunteers.

The church has good sound and audio-visual equipment that is available for any service. Radio microphones are used at most services. There is an induction hearing loop system installed. All our mainstream services are on screen. Although we currently do not have a worship group/band we have a complete set of equipment for one including microphones and foldback systems. It is our desire to return to live music for some services.

Baptisms - in 2023 there were 18 baptisms. Currently, the Clergy carry out baptism preparation. A lay visitor sends anniversary cards to children each year until they are 5.

Weddings - in 2023 there were 6 weddings and one blessing.

Funerals - in 2023 there were 12 funerals.

Ecumenical and other links

Links exist with a strong Nuneaton Christians Together, a group which has representatives from most of the churches in the town. There is a large purpose-built Mosque in the parish. We have a good relationship with the Mosque leadership. We have links with the hospital Chaplaincy team.



Worthy of mention is the Saints Project which is an Anglican led café and hub for the community based in the town centre, with a three-point vision for bringing community transformation to the heart of Nuneaton. All Saints, along with other local churches has had key part in the establishment of Saints.

Two members of the church founded and run a charity, which works predominantly with a school in Kenya. It is widely supported by the church community by personal donations, fund raising events and donations from our tithed giving. Our church school also supports their work.

Governance

All Saints has a Parochial Church Council (PCC) which meets monthly. There is a Standing Committee of 4 which meets on an ad hoc basis.

Additionally there is a "Preachers" team meeting monthly. It includes Licenced and other Lay members who help plan and deliver the range of church services. It actively encourages other members of the congregation to get involved and supports any visiting preachers.

All Saints PCC has currently 1 vacancy.

We have 3 representatives on Deanery Synod

One of the team is also part of the diocesan discernment / vocations group working with potential candidates as an adviser.

We also have links to the local Hospital Chaplaincy.

Finance

Financial Summary

Our church has three main streams of income, voluntary giving, letting out the Parish Hall and income from historic investments. For 2023 our planned giving was just under £22000. Hall income was £12500. Dividends (restricted) £22000.

The expenditure is very similar from year to year, generally in pace with inflation, most costs being of a relatively fixed nature such as heat and light, staff wages, parish share.

Expenditure for 2023 was £84,357. We currently pay about half of the total cost of ministry of the parish (parish share), a situation we would like to redress sooner rather than later.

Our priority is to increase income, preferably from existing members of the church giving regularly and attracting income from new church members. People now use cash much less than they did, also we had people attending services online. We have responded to this situation by introducing new ways of giving alongside the traditional ways.

Our ways of giving now are:

- Parish Giving Scheme which includes C of E Regular giving scheme and one-off payments both of which can be accessed via our QR code or online.
- Direct payment -into the Church bank account
- Cash or cheque -plate at the back of church and as a collection during our main services
- Debit or Credit card -Contactless Giving in church
- Donate button -on All Saints Coton web site

The Parish

Welcome to Astley Church. Welcome to our special place of worship and to our caring community. Astley village is located 4 miles from Nuneaton and 8 miles from Coventry with the A444 and the M6 and M42 motorways nearby. The roads to Astley village are rural in nature. The parish of Astley has a population of approximately 280 people and 72 homes. Astley is mainly an agricultural parish and the farming land and most of the housing around Astley are owned by Viscount Daventry of Arbury Estate. Lord Daventry is the Patron of Astley Church. There are currently 38 people on the church electoral roll. Astley has no shops or local pubs and has a bus service twice a week. It has a privately-run children's nursery located in the original Astley village school and this once Church of England school sadly closed in 1973. The Landmark Trust currently lease nearby Astley Castle from Arbury Estate, which has been restored as holiday accommodation and is a popular location for holiday breaks, and the Church and Castle are of great interest to many visitors during joint open weekends.

The local population is varied in age with some families living in the area for many generations. Families have longstanding ties with the church. Just outside the parish is a long stay nursing care home for people living with dementia, which has around 180 residents. Inside the parish is the popular Astley Book Farm which is located 2 miles away from Astley where visitors can enjoy refreshments and can look at and buy a vast number of second-hand books. There are also a few other small businesses. Over recent months, solar panel energy projects are still in the early stages of planning around Astley, and work continues in co-operation with Arbury Estate.

Astley is unique in many ways. The Church has a peaceful and spiritual history which goes back in time around a thousand years. It is deep in prayer and worship and to many individuals, it feels like home.

The village has an active Astley Parish Council who care for the village and its parish residents. Astley PCC has re-established a good relationship with Astley Parish Council and looks forward to working together for the good of the village, all residents, and the church congregation.

Astley Church lies prominently in the village of Astley and has a friendly and supportive congregation. The Churchwardens and volunteers ensure the church is welcoming for worship and for visitors. We want to share our church and fellowship with everyone.

Astley Church's History

Astley Church is a Grade I listed building and the village is proud to have this medieval building as the village church. The church was built in 1343 by Sir Thomas de Astley as a collegiate church, where monks and priests would sing for the souls of his family. It was once the size of a cathedral and cruciform in shape with a central tower and tall spire, transepts, long nave, and a Chancel. It was called the Lanthorn of Arden as the church was situated in the Forest of Arden and a light from the spire would guide travellers through the thick forest. The original spire eventually collapsed from the tower around 1550 due to lead theft, and fell into the church building causing a great deal of structural damage. The church building was thankfully restored by Sir Richard Chamberlayne in 1607 and Astley Church being reformed into the village church we see and have in use today. It is now one fifth of its former size. The church has past links to The Grey family (Lady Jane Grey) and the family once owned nearby Astley Castle. There are also close links also to the writer George Eliot (Mary Ann Evans) whose parents were married in Astley Church and George Eliot was born and lived on Arbury Estate. Astley Church is Knebley Church in her book "Mr Gilfil's Love Story" and the church's interior is beautifully described in this book.

There are beautiful original historic treasures still visible today such as 14C medieval misericords with paintings of apostles and prophets, post reformation wall paintings and alabaster figures representing The Grey family. There are 5 church bells in the tower. 4 bells are dated 1607 and the tenor bell was added in 1772. Astley Church is included in the book by Simon Jenkins "1000 Best Churches" and Nikolaus Pevsner's book "The Buildings of England".

Alongside the church lies Astley Castle, once a fortified manor house, and the building has been owned by four families over the centuries, The Astley's, The Grey's, The Chamberlayne's and the current Lord Daventry. Astley Castle became a ruin following a fire in 1978 but it has thankfully been restored by the Landmark Trust, and can now be booked for holidays and it is a popular holiday destination.

Worship

Astley Church has a regular service each Sunday at 3.30pm which is the Evening Prayer service according to the 1662 Book of Common Prayer. On the fourth Sunday the service is replaced by a Holy Communion service according to the Common Worship book. Most of our Sunday services are provided by our appreciated Lay Readers and Holy Communion by our Vicar, which is currently the Associate Minister from our sister church at All Saints Chilvers Coton. Easter morning and Christmas Day Holy Communion services start at the earlier time of 9am.

There are further special and traditional church services throughout the year being our popular Harvest Festival, where the church is decorated with harvest produce and the Carol Service by Candlelight with a local silver band. These traditional church services are popular and well attended, and these special services are also presided by the Associate Minister. The congregation and local community enjoy getting the church ready and looking wonderful to celebrate Harvest and Christmas.

The two Churchwardens are supported by sides-people and members of the church congregation. Now that Covid-19 appears to have become a distant memory normal church routines have now returned.

The organ is dated 1906 and further restored in 2013. Currently there is no organist to play during Sunday services but hymn music is provided using a music speaker and an organist is sought to play at other services when needed.

During Covid-19 we were unable to hold Sunday services but we all kept in contact through telephone calls and messages to ensure we were safe and keeping well. Astley Church soon opened for people to meet in private prayer and then our Sunday services returned once restrictions lifted, and Astley PCC followed all the government guidance as given.

The church congregation members and all our volunteers are friendly and very supportive of each other. We outreach to others via our Astley Social Group to friends old and new. Homemade cakes with tea are our speciality. We welcome everyone who joins our social activities, church events and all who just want to visit the church. People have commented how peaceful and prayerful the church is and have appreciated their time in this special place of worship.

Community of Astley Village

Astley village is a small group of houses which the majority are still owned by Arbury Estate. The village and surrounding land also owned by Lord Daventry and is therefore Astley is special and unique in many ways. It has a community building Astley Reading Room which is used for social events throughout the year. Astley PCC has the responsibility for the daily running of the Reading Room but this building is owned by Arbury Estate. The Reading Room has a fully fitted kitchen and disabled toilet facilities. There are no toilet facilities inside Astley Church as there is no water supply connected to the church building.

Astley is very fortunate to have a loyal and hard-working group of volunteers called Astley Social Group. These volunteers organise fund-raising village activities for the church congregation and friends. Activities are always fun and appreciated by all. Majority of the funds raised are towards the running of Astley Church and the Social Group provides fun events for everyone via the village Reading Room. Astley Social Group organise interesting talks with guest speakers followed by tea and cake on the 2nd Tuesday of each month held in the Reading Room. These are all well supported events by the local community and for visitors from further away, and include our June summer open weekend with stalls, games and refreshments and the annual Heritage Open Days weekend in September. We also thoroughly enjoy quiz and bingo nights with a fish and chip supper.

Everyone has made a great effort, and it is lovely to see that people have happily returned to these events and fellowship once more.

Administration

Astley Church shares a Parish Office and the Parish Secretary is based at our sister church All Saints Chilvers Coton, and Astley PCC financially contributes towards administration costs. Some administration is also completed by the Churchwardens. The Parish Secretary is our first point of contact for all Astley Church services including, Christenings, Weddings, and Funerals, liaising with Astley Churchwardens and we all enjoy a great working relationship. A weekly information letter "Pew Sheet" is provided by the Parish Office which gives useful information, news, and upcoming events to the congregation for both churches in the Benefice, and all information is passed to the Parish Secretary for this purpose. The living accommodation for Astley is located at The Vicarage, Chilvers Coton in Nuneaton, which is 5 miles from Astley.

Finance and Expenditure

Astley Church is a Grade I listed building and restoration and repairs will always be needed to keep this historic building in good order. The building is regularly maintained by our Churchwardens and a loyal group of maintenance volunteers who take pride in looking after the church, keeping it cared for and welcoming to all. Repair costs are always an issue and fundraising events help to partly fund some of the repairs, however most repair funds are met in the form of grants. Astley Church had its Quinquennial Inspection completed in April 2023 and is working with the church architect to agree a programme of future repairs and restoration.

Astley PCC has already completed a major wall painting restoration project working alongside English Heritage which ended in 2010. Recent successfully completed projects include the restoration of the church organ, update to the church building electrical system, a new Chancel carpet, churchyard tree inspection and action taken and the restoration and conservation of the fittings and headstocks to the five church bells. These projects were successfully funded by grants obtained by Astley PCC and other private donations. Full details of these restoration projects can be found on our Astley Church website.
