Naturally infectious, supernaturally blessed, unexpectedly fruitful and causing ripples of life and love across our Diocese. Voices from across the years, older and more recent urge more of us to be witnesses

"What an insidious reversal of the biblical command to be salt and light in the world. The rabbit-hole Christian remains insulated and isolated from the world when he/she is commanded to penetrate it. **How can we be the salt of the earth if we never get out of the saltshaker?**" REBECCA MANLEY PIPPERT

"It didn't take the goatherder a long time.
Whatever he learned he went out and shared every day, whatever he learned he went out and shared, and in that way the first church was planted in his home" [IN A MISSIONAL CONTEXT], JERRY TROUSDALE (MIRACULOUS MOVEMENTS) argues Jesus chose a time consuming disciple making strategy—



yet "within seventy years, the cadre of people around Jesus had taken His good news into every corner of the Roman world." He focused on a few to win many, engaging an entire family or group, not just the individual expecting the hardest places to yield the greatest results.

STEPHEN VERNEY (FIRE IN COVENTRY) — "evangelism is the proclaiming of good news about Jesus ... but it is not instructing people about something which I know and they don't. It is rather helping them to discover what they already know and to become what they really are. The first principle of evangelism must be that the Spirit of truth is already within the person whom I am approaching as an evangelist. The person and I are going to discover the truth together.... The evangelist will have to emerge from the encounter a changed person.... What we have got to do is to put ourselves together at the disaposal of God, so that we are no longer 'us' and 'them', but a company who may be grasped together by the Spirit of truth."

JESUS' BRIGHT IDEA: Jesus was ALIVE! And over the next forty days, he visited his friends. 500 in all. One minute he was doing IMPOSSIBLE things, like appearing out of nowhere in a locked room. The next he was doing ordinary, everyday things, like cooking fish at the seaside. It was all down to his brand-new resurrected BODY, a body bult to last for ever. 'I want you to tell my story to everyone, everywhere,' Jesus told his disciples. 'Make them disciples too. Baptise them in the name of the FATHER, and the SON and the HOLY SPIRIT. Teach them everything that I have taught you. And I will be with you as you do it. For ever. Always.' But how was he going to do that, exactly—be with them everywhere and always? This is how:...."

Of the Gen Z students turning to Christ in Toulouse, France recently Tony WILSON reports in Premier Christianity, March 2025 that souls are "won" for the Lord through strong and profound friendships. New Christians are then built into strong disciples through a programme (known as the *five vitamins*) teaching them how to pray, build fraternity, transform the mind, evangelise and serve the poor. Finally, when they graduate, they are "sent" into the world to make new disciples wherever they end up.

To do this we must become people of hospitality in a culture of hostility. We must embody and extend the love, welcome, warmth, and generosity of the inner life of God. THE FOURFOLD GOSPEL

"It was about the end of the first century that another collection of Christian writings began to take shape and to circulate among the churches. This was the fourfold Gospel. Mark's Gospel was published at first in the church of Rome, Matthew's in the churches of Syria and Palestine, John's in the church of Ephesus. Luke's presumably had a more widespread circulation as soon as it was released for general publication. But from the second century onwards we find the Catholic Church using all four of these gospels, and no other. By the time of Irenaeus (180), the fourfold character of the Gospel canon had become for orthodox Christians one of the accepted facts of life, as axiomatic as the four cardinal points of the compass ... there is something to be said for the view that the gathering of the fourfold Gospel was accomplished in Ephesus as an almost immediate sequel to the Gospel according to St John."

FF Bruce 'The Spreading Flame', p. 225

MICHAEL FROST, in *Mission is the Shape of Water* (2023) says that when FF Bruce wrote his early history of Christianity 'he found himself torn between focusing on the church as an institution or retelling the story of the Holy Spirit's work among his people.' He was haunted by the words of William Inge, the dean of St Paul's Cathedral, who said, '*The real history of Christianity is the history of a great spiritual tradition*.' By this, Inge was referring to the pattern of the Spirit's unceasing witness, even, at times, if it is only through a small remnant of the faithful. Bruce titled his book *The Spreading Flame* because, as he saw it, the advancement of Christianity was like that of a growing wildfire.'

He writes, "the redeeming message of Christianity burst as a great light on the people that walked in darkness." ... "Keeping the flame of faith burning is still our work. How brightly it burns depends on how dark the world around it is."

PRAYER JOTTINGS - APRIL 2025

PRAYER IN THE TRINITY

In 'The Essence of Prayer', Ruth Burrows speaks of 'Prayer in the Trinity', and her developing life of prayer.

She writes, "The only form of piety that made any appeal to me was what I would now call biblical theology. I read and reread the Gospels; prayed and prayed the stories and dialogues, seeing myself always as the person Jesus was confronting, and begging Jesus for the same graces of cleansing and healing: for sight, living water, food, faith, love ... I also prayed his own prayers: in the course of his ministry, at the last supper and in the garden, and, of course, these prayers were to the Father. Often, I used to think of those nights he spent alone praying to his Father, and wanted to identify myself with this prayer.... The New Testament became prayer. I realized that God spoke to me, revealed Himself to me in these texts, and my prayer was my response."



"It might seem that all this is only a human activity: a human person addressing the Son, Jesus, and with him, addressing the Father. And so it is. But, if we look closely, we see clearly that this 'activity' simply cannot derive merely from ourselves. Often enough, it runs clean counter to natural perception, to what our senses tell us. Flesh and blood do not reveal these things, nor enable us to respond. **There is a force, a Spirit within, that prompts,**

urges, enables us to ignore our own natural estimation of how things stand, and choose, instead, to believe. Nothing runs so counter to nature as the experience of our spiritual poverty, and a practical love for it such as this can only be done by the work of the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Jesus.... 'because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit who has been given to us.' (Romans 5.5)"

"We are being led, not by nature, but by the Spirit, for we are indeed God's children and the Spirit inspires our own spirit to cry out in confidence: 'Father, my dear Father.' (Romans 8.14-16).

It is the Spirit who continually upholds our natural weakness with divine strength; who is always praying deep within us even when our heart seems mute, uttering our most authentic desires, desires that we hardly know we have."



"THE AUTHENTIC SIGN"

Much of the unusual communicative power of the Celtic Christian movement was attributable to the ethos of its communicators and its communities. Aristotle believed that when auditors hear an advocate speaking, they are asking (perhaps subconsciously) whether the speaker can be trusted and believed. Aristotle observed that, in complex matters – like statecraft and religion – in which even the community of specialists cannot agree on what is true, the non-specialist public accepts "probability." The public accepts the idea, case or cause that seems most probably true, and their judgement of the idea is influenced by their judgement of the speaker; the advocate they see and perceive as most trustworthy, and believable is probably communicating truth.... "the authentic sign."
