

Parish support – support for parishes. *The Diocesan offices continue to provide support to parishes including: Safeguarding – training and advice and helping parishes to respond to safeguarding concerns and allegations; paying grants, stipends and pensions; managing investments; administering parish share; and producing budgets, reports and accounts; maintaining and improving our vicarages; resourcing lay ministry; discerning vocations; training ordinands and curates; managing clergy appointments; providing continuing ministerial development; providing HR support; advising about the care and development of churches (including the DAC) and helping to find grants; sharing news, information and resources with parishes; and arranging meetings and providing briefing papers for Diocesan Synod, Bishop's Council, and statutory diocesan committees.*

Parish Structures and Governance support

I often compare parish structures to flowerpots. In the same way that you would choose a pot to suit the needs of a plant, we should shape church structures for the sake of the life of the church that we want to grow. Being part of the Church of England can occasionally feel like inheriting a pot which is ornate, impractical and in places a bit cracked! There are often ways to make the structures we've inherited lighter or better fitting, however. Please pray that the life of the churches in the diocese would be supported rather than stifled by their structures, and particularly that the ones seeking support with particular issues would find the best way through.

The support available includes:

- Advice for churches on changes to governance structures such as uniting parishes or setting up joint councils
- Working with churches
- Training and support for Churchwardens
- Requests for help on a wide range of issues, from the charitable status of PCCs to food hygiene regulations

Please pray for everyone involved in the practicalities of church life in the Diocese, that they would have the energy, time and resources they need.



Parish HR Support Services

In the last year since the launch of the Parish HR Support services, I have received 37 support requests from the Warwick and Leamington Deanery alone. This is excellent and shows that the Parish HR Support System is being viewed upon as a reliable source of employment law support and advice. The queries specifically relating to Warwick and Leamington Deanery are below, however this service offers support with all employment law areas covering the entire employee lifecycle including eLearning for important employment topics.

- Family leave queries such as Maternity, Paternity and Adoption
- Recruitment support including safer recruitment
- Employment status checking and support – Employee, Worker or Self-employed
- Advice with recruitment, retention and conduct in relation to volunteers
- Disability and Neurodiversity support
- Disciplinary, Grievances, Capability issues, Restructures and Redundancies
- Handbook and Policy support
- eLearning enrolment for Sexual Harassment, Unconscious Bias and Equality & Diversity

I have been really pleased at the commitment of all the Parishes to have good HR policies and practices in place. My prayer is that the Parish HR Support Service will continue to evolve and be able to offer more support, particularly with a regular offering of training on important topics in the future.

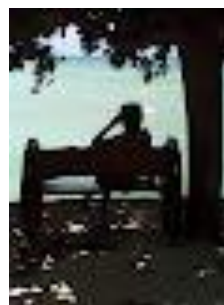

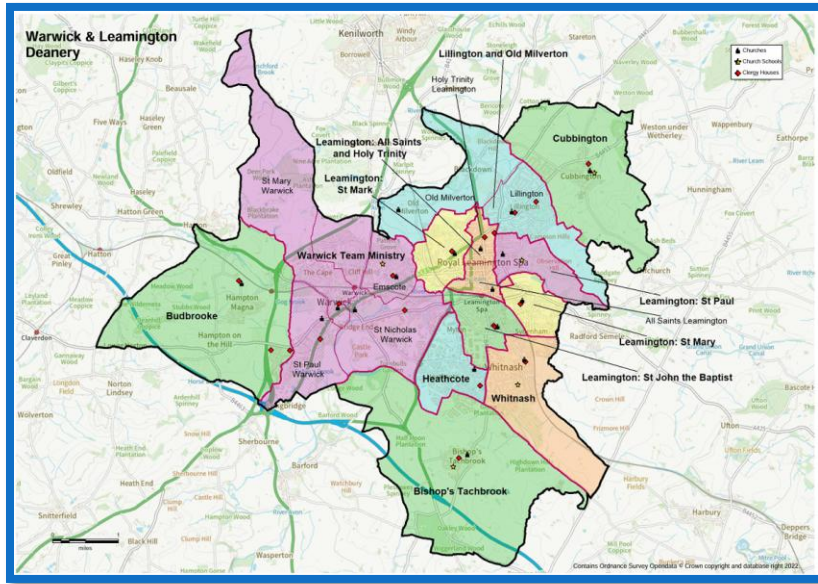
Faith and Young People (November).

PRAYER JOTTINGS – AUGUST 2025

- There are excellent, short Grove booklets on themes relevant to 'Quiet lives' including Spirituality and Pastoral Care. One (P172) from 2022, by retired GP and spiritual director, Rhona Knight, focuses on "Unforced Rhythms of Grace: Rest, Recovery and Flourishing in Ministry". She says, 'It is helpful to take time to reflect how well-watered the different aspects of our lives are and consider prayerfully where changes might be needed.' One way to do this is what she calls the '**Water Wheel**' – plotting on a scale from 0-10 where 0 is poorly watered and 10 well-watered in relation to segments including: **Family & Friends, Fun & Recreation, Vocation/employment, Health, Partner/Close Friendships, Relationship with God, Community, and Sabbath (rest day)**. Where we deem ourselves thirsty, she encourages us to consider how these areas might be 'watered' – How might God be inviting you to do this?

- John Mark Comer "Practicing the Way: Be with Jesus, Become like him, Do as he did" (2024, SPCK), also has a companion guide 'The Practicing the Way Course' (2024, Form) which over eight sessions enables an individual, couple or small group to review their relationship with Jesus, including handling pain and suffering, receiving healing and crafting a Rule of Life. Might this be an option for you and your home group this Autumn? Nicky Gumbel, Alpha pioneer, says of the book **"I love John Mark Comer's vision for life – to be with Jesus, become more like him, and aspire to do what Jesus would do. This book can only help us all in our own walk with Jesus."**
- From Thomas Keating's "Intimacy with God: an introduction to centering prayer" (Crossroad, 2020) St John of the Cross wrote, "*The Father spoke one word from all eternity and he spoke it in silence, and it is in silence that we hear it.*" This suggests that silence is God's first language and that all other languages are poor translations. *The discipline of Centering Prayer and the other traditional practices are ways of refining our receptive apparatus so that we can perceive the word of God communicating itself with ever greater simplicity to our spirit and to our inmost being. The practice of Centering Prayer, therefore, is not contemplation in the strict sense of the term but a preparation for it.*" (p. 15) He says that "*Centering Prayer is a method of prayer that comes out of the Christian tradition, principally The Cloud of Unknowing, and the writings of St John of the Cross. It brings us into the presence of God and thus fosters the contemplative attitudes of listening and receptivity*" *(p. x)

Encouragement to Receive

Clive Hicks writes *"I visited the National Gallery to escape the heat on 11th July. This almost photo-realistic image of Joseph, the father of Jesus, dreaming, caught my attention. Riveting as an image of a step 'beyond pondering in contemplative prayer' ... drifting into sleep, and being receptive to God's messenger. "after he had pondered these things, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to" (Luke 1.20a)*



Could this be a prompt for some of us to enter sleep in a more quietened, reflective state rather than heads busy with news, media, mobile screens etc?"

Frank Laubach, quoted in *Devotional Classics – Renovare* by Richard Foster and James Smith (Harper Collins, 1993) "*The day had been rich but strenuous, so I climbed "Signal Hill" at the back of my house talking and listening to God all the way up, all the way back, all the lovely half hour on the top. And God talked back! I let my tongue go loose and from it there flowed poetry far more beautiful than any I ever composed. It flowed without pausing and without ever a failing syllable for a half hour. I listened astonished and full of joy and gratitude [some might ask] "Why did God waste his poetry on you alone, when you could not carry it home?" ... I only know He did and I am happy in the memory.*"
