HOW HEALTHY IS YOUR CHURCH?

In the questions posed by our Archdeacons to churches across the Diocese in 2024, key leaders responded to - "how would you rate the health of your church at present?" - on a scale from 'really struggling' (0) to 'thriving' (5). There were 119 responses. Nobody marked this as '5'; 31% said '4' – which sounds like they are encouraged. 44% were neutral ('3'); 25% marked this as 1 or 2, or gave no response. If we are glass half empty some of us might say nearly 70% are neutral or worse; only 31% are happy with their church's health; the glass half full minded will say that 75% are OK or better. Other responses showed that what gave the greatest joy and new life emerging, were:

- Spiritual and numeric growth, the involvement of children & families, strong community links, effective clergy, the quality of fellowship and numbers of new attendees, gave the optimists grounds for more hope;
- All age worship, then links with church and non-church primary schools, along with toddler groups, were where connections with children and families seemed to be fostered in the healthiest contexts, but only 25% of churches were resourcing and supporting the faith of children, young people and families;
- The strongest community links were based on Foodbanks, Lunch Groups and Cafes, Schools Work, Toddler groups and special Festival services accounted for two thirds of mentions:
- Understandably, the main priorities for churches were Outreach, and especially Outreach to children and youth, Spiritual Growth and Improved Links with the community;
- There are efforts to connect with those new to faith in 62% of churches Alpha, Christianity Explored, Pilgrim, and the development of new worshipping communities in various forms:
- 50% of Parish Safeguarding Officers had been in post for five years or less, so it is encouraging that people are helping to make all our churches safe spaces, and there's still room to learn more via Diocesan training programmes;
- The financial health of our churches is understandably quite varied, with just 23% scoring 4 or above; 29% neutral; and 41% scoring 2 or lower.

The graphic (left) shows some of the areas I've developed a concern to see addressed in our churches – Red (missional, outreach), Green (thinking, strategy) and Blue (spirituality, wellbeing). I am hopeful that similar factors remain high in the awareness and concern of many more of us, as we pray and plan for healthier churches; above all, pray for hope-filled, healthy church cultures.

PRAYER JOTTINGS - FEBRUARY 2025



Ruth Burrows OCD (Sister Rachel) died just over twelve months ago – on 10 November 2023, aged 100. She had entered a Carmelite monastery in Derbyshire aged 18, and for 82 years she was an enclosed Carmelite nun; for more than 60 years she was in a monastery in Norfolk. It was said of her in a tribute from her Catholic Diocese,

"One felt that not only did she know the Gospels, but that she lived them. Following Jesus in her every-day and humdrum life was essential to her and encouraging others to do the same was the mainstay of her existence." Her books will offer us insights on spirituality and prayer for a few months.

Some of Ruth Burrows's books: *Guidelines for Mystical Prayer* (1976, Continuum) *Essence of Prayer* (2006, Bloomsbury); *Love Unknown* (2011, Bloomsbury) – the latter was Rowan Williams, then Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent book, in 2012.

Starting off on the right foot 'What do we mean by prayer? What does the word mean in the Christian context?' She says we almost always talk about prayer as something we do; this needs to be corrected. 'Our Christian knowledge assures us that prayer is essentially what God does, how God addresses us, looks at us. It is not primarily something we are doing to God ... but what God is doing for us.' (p. 1) And, she continues, 'It is not something we are doing to God, something we are giving to God but what God is doing for us. And what God is doing for us is giving us the divine Self in love.'

God – or ego? 'we must realise that what we have to do is allow ourselves to be loved, to be there for Love to love us. True prayer means wanting God not ego. We have to recognize that a great deal that goes for interest in and longing for prayer is a subtle form of self-seeking. To give ourselves seriously to prayer is to recognize this and face up to the choice it presents: we will cast aside our egotism, allow God's love to purify it more and more whatever the cost, or we camouflage it, give it other, more spiritual names ... The thing to do is, of course, to get down to praying! That will answer our questions.' (p. 3, 4)

Get out of the boat; walk on the waters with Jesus 'We have to be willing to let go of our own criterion of what prayer is and what growth in the Spirit might mean. There are all sorts of ways of praying and there are books galore to direct us on them; yet these, at bottom, keep us in the boat.' (p. 4) 'Real prayer lets go of the controls ... Most of us see this as an unfortunate occurrence that must never be repeated, and so we refit our boat, and improve our sailing skills to ensure that we have control once more.' (p. 5)

She then quotes this prayer of Julian of Norwich,

God of Thy goodness, give me Thyself: for Thou art enough to me, and I may nothing ask that is less that may be full worship to Thee: and if I ask anything that is less, ever me wanteth – but only in Thee I have all. from Revelations of Divine Love, ch. 5

Bob Dudley, from the *Diocesan Spiritual Formation Group* shares this favourite quote from Ruth Burrows, Prayer is essentially God's work. Our part is to give time, do our best to keep attention, surrender ourselves as best we can. Then we can be sure that God works. Faith does not ask for signs, for tokens. When we really grasp that prayer is essentially God's business, not ours, we will never talk of failure, no matter how unsatisfactory prayer seems to us.
