>> LEADERSHIP <<

Bishop Sophie started the day at Blue Coat Church of England School in Coventry - she posed the question, "What do you think is an important quality in a leader today?" to the students, and in response to their ideas commented; "I was struck by the students' thoughts of what qualities people in leadership should have, with service and empathy being especially important, which I whole heartedly agree with."

>> PRACTICAL CARF <<

At St Francis Employability, a charity which provides vital support for unemployed people based at St Francis Church, Radford, Bishop Sophie said; "I am so very inspired to see the support and excellent practical care being shown to those in our communities who are in need."

>> RECONCILIATION <<

I am committed to leading a Diocese that extends the hand of friendship across the differences that can so easily divide us and play a leading role in the work of reconciliation that for Christians, lies at the very heart of our faith."

>> SINGING & THE ARTS <<

Bishop Sophie dropped in at an after-school club at Kineton Church of England School. As a keen soprano herself, Bishop Sophie enjoyed joining in with the children and talked to them about the importance of music to wellbeing and mental health. As someone who is deeply passionate about the arts and theatre, Bishop Sophie found the tour of the Royal Shakespeare Theatre fascinating and looks forward to frequent visits to the theatre when she moves here.

>> PRAYERFUL & HEAVENLY-MINDED <<

At St Nicholas Church, Alcester, our Rural Mission Hub, where people can come from rural churches for support, she addressed parishioners gathered for a prayer meeting with a message encouraging Christians to be future focused people, whose true citizenship is in heaven.

Young Person's Pathway

Earlier this year we heard from a church in our diocese who have been meeting regularly with their young adults and have found a regular pattern of meeting, learning and mentoring for people to explore their gifts and ministries. This brilliant story of journeying with their young people has led to the creation of a Young people's Pathway. Unlike other Pathways it allows you to choose your sessions from across different ministry areas (or stick with a specific one) and to meet with other young adults to discuss and explore leadership. As you pray, I wonder which young people's names come to mind. I wonder what you can do to support them (or they support you). Not sure what young people think, do or want?

Have a look at this <u>report from Youthscape</u> for ideas on how to pray for them. The original research was done with 14 to 18 year-olds, some of whom will now be in their early 20s. So, it is helpful to see key trends for ideas on how to engage with, support and importantly pray for our young people.

If you are close to this age group, I wonder how it resonates with your experience.

PAUSE FOR PRAYER - in 2025

"A pause allows something to happen which would otherwise not occur, and you never quite know what that will be"

Do / PAUSE: YOU ARE NOT A TO DO LIST— is the title of 2019 book by Robert Poynton. The series of books published by The Do Book Company are handbooks on a wide range of eclectic 'Do' topics including: Beekeeping, Design, Disrupt, Improvise, Lead, Listen, Preserve, Story and Sourdough! In Do/PAUSE we are encouraged to design a calendar of pauses—a diary is usually 'chopped into clearly delineated chunks'—but what if you invented your own, with different layers of time such as 'Learning, tasks, loves, distractions—Mind, hand, body, heart—Me, you, them, us—Money, beauty, fun'? we are asked

What would it look like if you more consciously introduced God into your busy diary (or calendar)?

How might His presence direct the tasks you select, the learning you decide is most important, who you pray for,

and where you need spaces to be refreshed ... day by day, week, by week, month by month this year?

What will your mind focus on in scripture, on where your steps take you, what exercise your body needs?

Who will you pray for each day, how will you open yourself to be changed by the Holy Spirit,

where will God direct you to pray beyond your closest circle of family and friends?

What unexpected adventures and opportunities might come your way?

How might you direct your giving and use of gifts?

What joys lie ahead?



Time Capsule for 2025



It wouldn't be Christmas without a little project or two. This time capsule struck us as a lovely way to consider where God might lead us in 2025. It would make a great activity with friends, children and grandchildren.

A new year can be an opportunity for setting goals, new opportunities and taking chances – three things which prayer might help us to see more clearly.

What you need:

Slips of paper, pens, a box or other container.

What to do:

Find a small box or jar (about to hit the recycling pile)!

Pray and ask God for guidance as you approach 2025.

Listen for God's voice - that might be in a word or a feeling or any other way that is personal to you - and write down what comes to you. Any words? Ideas? Areas of your life to work on? Issues you feel are stirring your heart?

Write any prayers you have for 2025, and anything you've heard from God on slips of scrap paper.

Put these slips of paper into your box or jar (You may also want to include these somewhere you will see them regularly, like a journal).

Keep your container safe until the end of 2025. When you open it again at the end of the year, you may find, before you, answers to prayer, areas of your life God has worked in, and situations he has changed for you.

Repeat for 2026!

Include strips of paper or card – some naming the Deaneries in the Diocese; on others name individuals you would like to pray for in 2025; include our bishop and archdeacons; add youth workers and chaplains; add your own church, other

churches, charities you support, people you long to thrive by coming to know Jesus, and other people you

want to pray for regularly; *pray for them in 2025*. **Each day - perhaps even more than once a day - you can choose three to pray for.**

- The prayer theme this month is *Growing (Young Adult) Leaders* and New Year Coming up the *Themes* for the next 4 months focus on Healthy Churches (February), Lent and Easter (March/April) and New Worshipping Communities (May). Do consider sending me your prayer suggestions, and any other jottings.
- Generally, each month we focus on a different Deanery; this month there is a break in this pattern, but we will return with a really local focus in February when we will be praying for Southam Deanery, and Rugby Deanery in March.
