Climate resilient church

A new national project is identifying churches taking successful action to make their buildings and/or their communities more resilient in the face of increased weather and climate events, and then sharing findings and solutions through diocesan workshops.

Whilst climate change is often viewed as a future event, it is unfortunately true that all around the world people are already feeling the effects of a changing climate. Whilst our minds might immediately go to the recent drought in Madagascar or flooding in Bangladesh, it is also apparent that climate change is already having a real impact in the UK.

All ten of the warmest years on record have occurred since 2002. Last year saw the wettest February on record resulting in widespread flooding. The wettest day on record was also in 2021, on the 3rd of October. We are also facing an increased number of storm events that will also be more extreme. These climate events and harsh conditions have a negative impact not only on the buildings the church owns, but the communities who live near them and utilise them.

This new national research project focuses on how the Church can cope with these new climate challenges. The work is fully funded by the Natural Environment Research Council, who have funded a researcher from the Tyndall Centre for Climate Change Research in Manchester, Chris Walsh, within the Cathedrals and Church Buildings Division for 12 months.

The good news is that there is already some brilliant work taking place in the Church of England and other heritage organisations and this project aims to support that work and amplify its success across the heritage and church sectors. It also wants to examine the barriers to making these changes and work on ways to minimise and overcome them.

Some of these include St Barnabas's, Eltham who used their church building as a refuge from the heat or Snaith Priory Church which became the community hub and crisis centre during recent floods or the many churches like St Marys Primrose Hill that use their space to offer shelter to those who cannot escape from the cold of winter. The research will help to educate, motivate and empower others to take actions that will not only protect their ministry but enhance it, through supporting community resilience.

Chris Walsh says; "Climate change is already having massive impacts on our churches and communities, and it will continue to do so in rural churches like St Esprit in Marton where I grew up, to urban churches like where I now live in Salford. This project is only the start of the work the Church of England will be doing around climate resilience and we'd love for you to be involved, please join in with one of our workshops to learn more and contribute to the guidance we are producing"



Prayer Diary October 2022

'I would rather be on a mountain thinking about God than in church thinking about a mountain.'

I love these words of John Muir, a Scottish-American environmentalist. They convey to me the sense of liberty and joy of being out and about in God's good creation. There is something healing and whole-making about it. Doctors can now prescribe 'walking' for this very reason! We know that space with God in God's creation is healing. It is good for us in body, mind and spirit. God ministers to us through his creation. The development of *Forest Church* and *Walking*



Church is a testament to this. Many of us when we walk find ourselves not only praising God *for* his creation but also praising God, as St Francis did, *with* all creation. This dimension of praise is, of course, a strand that is woven into the scriptures. 'Make a joyful noise to the Lord all the earth' Ps 100.1. 'Let everything that has breath, praise the Lord.' Ps.150.6. 'Let the fields be jubilant and everything in them, then the trees will sing for joy before the Lord.' 1 Chron.16. 'You shall go out with joy and be led forth in peace, the mountains and hills will burst into song before you and all of the trees will clap their hands.' Is. 55.12.

All of which serves to remind us that we are not saved *from* creation, we are saved *with* creation, as Paul makes clear in Romans 8.22. It is the indigenous peoples across the world who knew and lived out this deep symbiotic relationship between humanity and all of creation. To our shame, as we know and as we repent, colonialists and not least colonial Christianity in pride and deep ignorance trashed, oppressed and colonized such communities, destroying their way of life that embodied deep wisdom about living in right relationship with God's creation.

As we enjoy God's creation, let us apply this wisdom in the light of the Lordship of Christ in whom, through whom and for whom all things were created and in whom all things hold together. Col. 1.15-17.



How can churches respond to the cost of living crisis?

Many of us will be feeling the effects of the cost of living crisis. In the last few years, costs have been steadily rising, with inflation at a 30-year high and food, fuel and energy prices increasing with wages and benefits not keeping up. For some the result of this is devastating, with rising numbers unable to meet their basic living needs such as adequate heating for the home, appropriate clothing or good nutrition.



As Christians, we are called to help those in need. So what can churches do? Sadly, churches do not have the resources to lift all out of poverty or to change the structures that have led to the cost of living crisis. However, churches can help alleviate suffering and be a central hub for the local community. Here are a few suggestions of ways to help:

- **Support for bills** -Perhaps your church could consider setting up a contingency fund that people could apply for in emergencies to help pay their bills.
- Coffee mornings or lunchclubs -Hosting a free or subsidised weekly coffee morning or lunchclub can be a great way for people to get together and socialise as well as helping with food poverty.
- Warm refuges—Whilst many churches may be struggling to heat their own buildings, others may be in a good place to offer their building (or church hall) as a warm refuge for people who cannot afford heating. The Warwickshire Rural Community Council has been coordinating warm hubs in Warwickshire.
- Holiday clubs—Running a children's holiday club with a meal included can help parents with childcare during the holidays and ensure children (particularly those who receive free school meals) have access to a good, balanced meal.
- **DIY support**—Maybe you can get together a group of volunteers who are good at DIY to help people with insulation, draft-exclusion and other small DIY tasks that can help with bills.
- **Debt advice**—Some churches already run debt advice clinics, but as the demand for support is set to rise, it might be a good idea to recruit more volunteers. Or perhaps this is a new venture you are interested in and would like to find out more. Christians Against Poverty has information about becoming a CAP debt centre.
- **Prayer** Please pray for politicians and policymakers that the decisions they make help support and protect those in need. Also pray for charities and churches who are providing help, that they have the resources they need. Finally pray for the safety and wellbeing of all those affected by the cost of living crisis.

St Mary's Church, Warwick gets funding from National Churches Trust

St Mary's Church in Warwick is to share in a £437,000 urgent funding pay-out from the National Churches Trust.

A £20,000 National Churches Trust Cornerstone Grant will help to pay for urgent repairs including repointing, pointing, repairing and replacing the eroded stonework of the tower at St Mary's, Warwick, to ensure the church thrives.



The church also receives a £10,000 Wolfson Fabric Repair Grant from the Wolfson Foundation on the recommendation of the National Churches Trust.

Broadcaster and journalist Huw Edwards, Vice President of the National Churches Trust, said:

"I'm delighted that St Mary's is being helped with funding for urgent tower repairs. This will safeguard unique local heritage and keep the church open and in use for the benefit of local people."

"Whether seeking quiet reflection, access to community services or a place to worship, the National Churches Trust helps hundreds of churches each year and with the support of local people keeps them thriving today, and tomorrow."

Paul Ramsbottom, chief executive of the Wolfson Foundation said:

"As well as being places of worship and buildings of beauty, churches sit at the heart of the community. In many ways they stand between the past and present. We are thrilled to continue our partnership with the National Churches Trust to support the preservation of these significant, much-loved historic buildings across the UK."

41 churches across the UK will stay open and in good repair thanks to £437,000 of funding awarded by the National Churches Trust. 21 churches benefit from £134,000 of Wolfson Fabric Repair Grants. In 2021 the National Churches Trust made 304 awards to churches worth £5.2 million.
