# St Martin's Finham opens a community coffee shop

St Martin's Finham celebrated a successful first week of its new community Coffee Shop, Revive, with a visit from Bishop Christopher on Sunday 6th March. The Bishop led a service involving the whole church family and then prayed a blessing in the Coffee Shop area. He even got to have a go at making his own latte!

The Coffee Shop opened its doors to the public on Shrove Tuesday, 1st March, and is already proving to be very popular, with many people coming from the local community and beyond



to sample the tasty homemade food and good coffee and tea.

The Coffee Shop is part of a whole vision to further open up the St Martin's site to the local community, with a Repair Café, Community Gardening and a children's play area all being planned for the near future. All are designed to help the community to connect with church, God and each other in deeper, more meaningful ways that more fully share the love of Jesus as part of daily life. All are also designed to help combat isolation and loneliness that have been such an issue for so many during the last two years.

Care for our environment is also at the forefront of the Coffee Shop and other community projects, with ethical, locally-sourced produce being used wherever possible. Even the furniture has been part of their efforts to "reduce, reuse, recycle" — with beautiful tables being made from old oak pews no longer in use in the church itself and choir stalls and old lecterns being repurposed to make specials boards, panelling and other furniture.

Revd Matt Taylor, vicar of St Martin's said: "Many people connected with us online during the pandemic and have begun to see St Martin's as a place of welcome in general terms and we want to build on these strong new links with local residents and open our church site up further, allowing us to share God's love with those around us in practical as well as emotional and spiritual ways."

The church is excited to welcome people to the Revive Coffee Shop (its opening hours are Tuesday-Friday, 9am-2pm, and Saturdays, 9.30am-12.30pm) and would also love to welcome more volunteers if anyone local to Finham would like to get involved.




## **Prayer Diary**

April 2022

'He is going before you into Galilee, there you will see him, as he told you. Mark 16.7.

Galilee, not Jerusalem, the centre of religious observance, but Galilee, 'out there' where life is lived. This is where they will meet the risen Lord, as he had told them. (Mark 14.28, Matt.28.10). The risen Christ is to be encountered in the so-called 'secular' world. Though, of course, there is nothing 'secular' to God. 'The earth is the Lord's, and all who dwell in it' (Ps 24.1) and, as Paul writes, 'all things were through him and for him.' (Col.1.16).



Have we as Christians become too timid, too comfortable, too settled where we are, too church-centric? Apart from the wonderful work of chaplains and their teams, whose locus is in 'Galilee', I fear we have. In 'Galilee', most people are more

interested in life than in religion. This is true of God too! Jesus comes to bring us life, abundant, overflowing life. (John 10.10) Paul describes this life to Timothy as the life 'that really is life'. (1 Tim.6.19)

So, mission is not about us bringing Christ into a godless world. The risen Lord is already alive and at large in the world. God is at work in so many lives outside 'Jerusalem', outside the church. We see this in the Gospels, in the Roman centurion, in the Samaritan leper, in the Syro-Phoenician woman. The harvest is plentiful, says Jesus. This is perhaps especially true in this most precarious time, in which the pandemic has cracked open many of our securities and more of us are conscious of our fragility and our mortality and we face the possibility of an escalating war. People 'out there' are receptive to the good news of Jesus Christ. A recent survey indicated that 51% of people aged 18-34 say that they pray. The harvest is plentiful. What are we doing about it? All of us are called. All of us are sent. The risen Lord said/says 'Go ...... and know that I am with you always to the end of the age.' (Matt.28.20). So, if we do what it says on the tin, we need to get out more!

#### **Church Homepages**

#### **Featured News and Events**

**Users said:** Visitors don't realise they can click an arrow to see more news and events.

ACNY did: Made the button on the featured items bigger and wrote 'See all' on it.

#### **Analytics**

**Users said:** I'm not sure if the visitors can see the analytics info that I can.

Users did: Moved analytics information to the new editor view.

# Do you have stories of God answering prayer?

A new Christian landmark is to be built in the Midlands. Eternal Wall of Answered Prayer will be a huge, thought-provoking piece of public art, aiming to kindle conversations about prayer.

The iconic structure will be constructed using one million bricks, each brick featuring an answered prayer. This Christian landmark will make hope visible by digitally linking visitors with a database of one million answered prayers, using interactive



technology and a bespoke app. Visitors will be able to use their smart device, holding it against any brick to read the individual answered prayers.

Built near Coleshill on the outskirts of Birmingham, Eternal Wall will stand at 169 feet, eclipsing the size of the Angel of the North, and is expected to attract 300,000 visitors each year. 500,000 journeys will see Eternal Wall every week from the M6, M42, HS2, and flight paths from Birmingham Airport.

The idea of the Eternal Wall project is to grow a nation of storytellers who are able to articulate the hope they've found in God through sharing answered prayers – whilst the physical landmark will be in the Midlands, the stories of hope will be accessible via the app from anywhere in the world. The core aim is to Make Hope Visible in the UK and further afield.

The Eternal Wall project are reaching out to UK churches to help them gather answered prayers. You may already have many as a congregation which you could submit, and/or you may have someone in your congregation able to help facilitate gathering more. They are looking for representation from every part of the UK and every church network. These can be submitted any time on their website at <a href="https://www.eternalwall.org.uk/testimony">https://www.eternalwall.org.uk/testimony</a> (written, video or audio are all invited), but they are also holding a 45 minute zoom on Monday 4 April in the early evening to share more about gathering answered prayers on a larger scale.
