St David, Newbold on Stour receives funding from National Churches Trust

St David, Newbold on Stour, well known for its magnificent stained glass, is to share in a £473,700 funding package from the National Churches Trust. A £5,000 National Churches Trust Cornerstone Grant will help fund urgent work to St David's church to keep it at the heart of the local community.



Broadcaster and journalist Huw Edwards, Vice President of The National Churches Trust, said:

"I'm delighted that the much loved church of St David, Newbold on Stour is being helped with a £5,000 National Churches Trust Cornerstone Grant. The grant will help fund the installation of a much needed kitchen and toilets, safeguarding unique local heritage and help St David continue to support local people."

The parish of St David's, Newbold on Stour with Armscote, was built in 1835. It is a large church built in the Gothic style of local two toned white/grey sandstone with rich brown accents of ironstone, lancet windows, and an open roof with ornamental rafters.

The stained-glass windows of the chancel are completely filled with late Victorian glass, the most significant being the east window of three lancets, dated 1884, most likely the work of Lavers & Westlake. The central window is an unusual depiction of the Apocalyptic Christ as described in the Revelation of St John. The "Son of Man" holds an open book, seven stars in his right hand, and a sword issuing from his mouth; before Him stand seven lampstands and below ecclesiastics look up in adoration. The smaller lancets flanking this are more down to earth depictions of Christ as teacher and healer.

The grant will help fund the installation of a kitchen and toilets. Newbold's population is growing and the new facilities will enable the church hold a wide range of community events.

This will substantially increase revenue, helping put the church on a firmer financial footing. Churchwarden, Gillian Marsden who is overseeing the project said:

"The completion of this project will have a life-changing effect on our parish church, it will open up numerous opportunities to expand and extend the use of the building for the community."



Prayer Diary January 2022

"Today I begin again"

As we step out into the New Year (yes, I know the Church year begins in Advent!) let us not miss out on its newness. What do I mean by this? There is always more for each of us to discover and to enter into. In Christ we are new creation, and continually through the Spirit we are being made new. As the people of Israel discovered on their long journey through the wilderness, yesterday's manna is not fresh today. How often do we miss out on what God wants to give us today, even now, this moment because we are living- in our minds - in the past or the future? How often are we truly present to God who is always present to us? Augustine, in his *Confessions* addressed to God, looking back to the time before he experienced the good news of Christ, wrote 'You were with me but I was not with you'.

All of us, no doubt, in one way or another continue to be impacted by the multifarious effects of the pandemic but we are not to let this define us. In early 6th century B.C. the people of Israel were no doubt oppressed and depressed by the circumstances in which they found themselves. Jerusalem had fallen to the invading armies of Babylon. Jeremiah, or the author of Lamentations, railed against God in no uncertain terms about this. He needed to express his desolation and anger. We too

need to do this when we feel it. Having brought it all out to God, he begins to recognize and remember that God's covenant love never lets us go, his compassion never fails, 'his mercies are new every morning. Great is your faithfulness'.

St Anthony of Egypt began each day with the words 'Today I begin again'. God offers us opportunities every moment of every day to acknowledge, welcome and respond to his love. As we journey together into and through this new year, let us make time simply to *be* with God, to welcome his presence and receive his love. Let us know, not as an idea but as an *experience*, that the Lord is here, His Spirit is with us. Then we can *be* the good news of the Gospel.

Bishop of Coventry to lead Further and Higher Education work

As we take forward our Vision for Further and Higher Education, Bishop Christopher will champion the church's commitment to supporting excellence and educational opportunities for all, as well as encouraging the important work chaplains do across educational communities."

Until the 19th century, all British universities were religious foundations, and The Church of England has maintained this long-standing involvement. It has a particular connection with the universities that make up the Cathedrals' Group of universities. These Anglican foundation universities have a historic church foundation which is a core part of their ethos and commitment to creating a fairer, wiser and more caring world. They fulfil a vital role in their local communities, and are significant contributors to the development of education as they train a quarter of all the teachers in England between them.

Nigel Genders, the Church of England's Chief Education Officer said:

"The Church wants to see people flourishing in all aspects of their lives. For us that means working with universities and colleges as well as government departments, getting involved in national debates about what universities and further education colleges are for. Bishop Christopher will bring great wisdom and experience to this engagement."
