New Diocesan Secretary

The Right Reverend Dr Christopher Cocksworth has announced that Jacqueline Ladds will be the next Diocesan Secretary and Chief Executive Officer of the Diocese of Coventry.



Jacqueline joins the Diocese from the Health and Care Professions Council where she was Executive Director for policy and external relations. She will start her new diocesan role on Monday 23 May.

The purpose of the post is to see that the Diocese of Coventry has the structures, systems and resources in place so that it can fulfil its transformative mission to the permanent benefit of the people of Coventry, Warwickshire and Solihull it serves. The position became vacant after the previous Diocesan Secretary, Ruth Marlow, retired earlier this year.

Jacqueline will be a key member of the Bishop's Core Staff Team, whose vision is to see restored health, new growth and renewed relationships within the whole diocese. Bishop Christopher said:

"I am delighted that Jacqueline is joining us in the Diocese of Coventry. She will bring her wide ranging experience, many gifts and real commitment to serve the work of the Church. I am sure that colleagues across the varied life of the diocese in its parishes, schools, chaplaincies and cathedral, as well as in the diocesan offices themselves, will greatly enjoy working with Jacqueline."

Jacqueline said:

"I am honoured to have been appointed as Diocesan Secretary and humbled to be able to serve in this role. I am looking forward to working with the diocesan team in supporting you all as we work together to worship God, make disciples and transform communities."

Coventry Cathedral celebrates Diamond Jubilee

On the 25th May 2022, Coventry Cathedral turned 60. A service of Celebration and Thanksgiving was held with the Archbishop of Canterbury preaching.

Coventry Cathedral was consecrated on the 25th May 1962. The Queen, Princess Margaret, and the then Archbishop of

Canterbury, Dr Michael Ramsey, attended the New Cathedral consecration service alongside thousands of local people.

Sixty years later, Archbishop Justin Welby, Bishop Christopher, Dean John Witcombe, diocesan clergy, representatives of the Community of the Cross of Nails International Board and students from diocesan schools came together to give thanks for 60 years and commissioned the cathedral for the years to come.

During his sermon, Archbishop Justin Welby said:

"I owe this place more than I can describe. I love it's very stones. And I know it can be more in the next 60 years even than it has been in the last 60"

Dean John Witcombe said:

"We give thanks for 60 amazing years of worship and creativity, reconciliation and renewal in Coventry Cathedral - and look ahead to the next 60 years, reimagining our future and embracing hope together."

Energy Footprint Tool is open

The Energy Footprint Tool has reopened for churches around the country to enter their 2021 utility bills, and find out their carbon footprint.

In February 2020, the General Synod announced an ambitious target for the Church of England to become net zero by 2030. The Energy Footprint Tool is an important step in measuring a baseline



of current emissions, and to measure progress towards achieving this goal.

This is a first step for the Church of England to understand and monitor the footprint of some 40,000 buildings across England. More and more parishes are getting involved and adding their data every day. Helping to build up a picture for the church to take action.

The Energy Footprint Tool is available for all parishes using the Online Parish Returns System and only takes ten minutes to complete. To complete the tool, you will need to have the whole of last year's electricity and gas/oil bills. The Energy Footprint Tool will tell your church the amount of carbon produced annually by heating and lighting your church buildings. There are two useful graphs that show you your efficiency scores: one for energy efficiency based on building size and one for attendance. It can take account of separate buildings such as church halls, as long as you have the utility bills for them.

The EFT is now open for you to enter your 2021 utility bills. It remains open until July 31st 2022.
