# Prayer Diary

April 2021

*'He is no longer here. He is risen.'* Matt.28:6

It took time for those first disciples to recognize him, but when they did their lives were changed forever. They could not contain their joy. Earlier Jesus had told them 'Your tears will be turned to joy.' The experience of encountering the risen Lord transformed those fearful, hopeless, dejected and leaderless disciples into confident evangelists who could not stop themselves sharing the good news, that 'The Lord is risen', 'Jesus is alive'. They knew that this was not just good news for them but for the whole world.



Without them sharing the gospel of the resurrection of Christ, often to the point of martyrdom, we would not now be here celebrating and sharing that same joyful news. For those first disciples and for disciples ever since what we celebrate and proclaim is not simply an event in history – which it was – but a present tense reality. The Lord *is* risen. He *is* risen indeed. Alleluia!

Evangelism is communicating not so much the idea of the resurrection but the *experience* of the risen Christ who lives in us. St Paul tells the Christ followers in Rome 'The Spirit of God who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you.' 8.11. It is only out of a living relationship with God that our faith can be contagious. So let us pray that we, each one of us, and the whole Church may experience afresh the reality of the risen Christ within us and among us that our lives may bear fruit for his glory.

As St Augustine put it 'Without God, we cannot. Without us, God will not.'

## Saints is a key project in successful Nuneaton £23.5 million bid

Saints Nuneaton, a joint venture between Together for Change Coventry and Warwickshire and Churches in Nuneaton, is one of several key projects part of the Nuneaton Town Investment plan, which was approved as part of the government budget announced on Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> March.

Saints is a community hub and café based in the town centre, with a three point vision for bringing community transformation to the heart of Nuneaton.



The first point of the vision, already well underway, involves encouraging and supporting small businesses, the development of skills and raising aspirations. The portion of the funds applied for by Saints will help to facilitate the second and third points of the vision – with work in areas of physical, mental and emotional wellbeing, and encouraging the creative arts and community connection.

Funds will secure the long term future of the project in its current location, a building which was originally the Nuneaton Conservative Club. It will also enable renovation work to be carried out on St Georges Hall on the first floor of the building, as well as repurposing rooms in the basement for training and meeting.

With these areas renovated, the building will become a multi-purpose venue, with space to host more creative and innovate projects and initiatives that outwork the three-point vision and impact the community in a positive way. Furthermore, it will create opportunity for generating income with external hire of rooms, which can then be fed back into the work of Saints.

This is a landmark achievement for Saints, after opening at the beginning of 2020 and adapting to serve the community in new ways throughout the coronavirus pandemic, and there is a great deal of excitement and anticipation for the future ahead. Though it has been a challenging year for many, the securing of this bid brings hope for Nuneaton, with projects that will breathe new life into the town.

## New Message Bus to be based in Warwick

Work has begun on a double decker bus to turn it into a Message Bus for the young people of Warwick and the surrounding areas.

Message Buses are part of The Message, a UK Christian charity that delivers work in schools, creates Christian youth resources and supports local churches with mission and evangelism training. Message Buses are state of the art mobile youth centres that work across the UK. This new bus will be the first Message Bus in the Midlands.



Together for Change obtained funding through the Warwick Churches Team and King Henry 8th Trust, to give a grant to the Message Trust which has enabled the Message Bus to be commissioned. The bus will be based in Warwick and used to support young people in that area, but it can also be hired out across the diocese when it is free, with the main objective being to launch new Christian youth groups and support existing youth groups and schools work. The bus can accommodate up to 30 young people from a classroom - giving ample space for learning.

The bus is currently being stripped out and prepared for the installation of state of the art technologies including; Xboxes, karaoke machines, plasma screens, iPads and also a kitchen that will serve hot food. There will also be an outdoor space with seating, outdoor plasma screens, a parasol and food hatch.

A full time Youth Evangelist/Bus Manager has also been funded to enable the bus to run and deliver quality youth provision. This person will be responsible for raising volunteers and additional bus drivers who can facilitate the vision of the bus youth ministry.

CEO of Together for Change, Jet Jones says;

*"The Message Trust have a long history of working with the most disadvantaged young people and engaging them with exciting presentations on the gospel of Jesus and we are looking forward to partnering with them. Watch this space for more updates on this exciting project!"*
